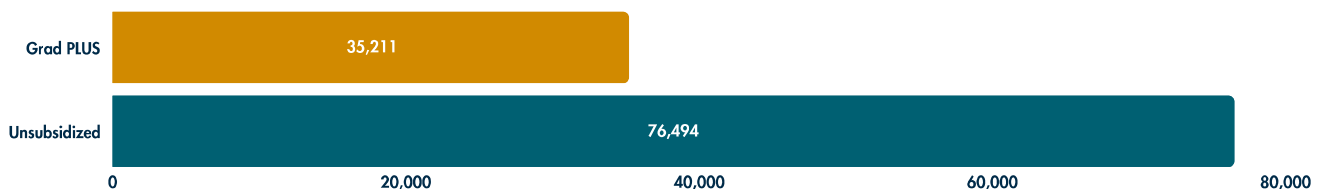

Graduate and Professional Borrowing Patterns

Borrowing patterns in your state — such as the number of recipients in graduate student loan programs during the 2024-25 academic year, including the **Grad PLUS** and **Direct Unsubsidized** programs — emphasizes the need for federal policies to ensure these programs remain accessible and affordable.

Navigating student loan debt repayment is critical for long-term financial stability upon degree completion. Programs like **income-driven repayment (IDR)** provide relief by reducing monthly payment costs, but continued policy protections are essential.
